

Overall scenario of the district

It is the northernmost district of Burdwan division. Jamtara, Dumka and Pakur districts of the state of Jharkhand lie at the western border of this district, whereas the border in other directions is covered by the districts of Bardhaman and Murshidabad of West Bengal.



As a result the district has location wise advantages in terms of sourcing of raw materials from Bihar, specially maize, fruits from Murishadabad and paddy from Burdwan.

The district ranks 15th in terms of literacy rate and 5th in terms of sex ratio among all other districts of West Bengal.

Birbhum is primarily an agricultural district with around 75% of the population being dependent on agriculture. Principal industries of the district include cotton and silk harvesting and weaving, rice and oilseed milling, several rivers flow across Birbhum. Some of these are Ajay, Mayurakshi, Kopai, Bakreshwar, Brahmani, Dwarka, Hinglo, Chapala, Bansloi, Pagla etc. However irrigation and soil condition are major hindrance for development in agriculture in the district.

District Profile:

Population:

According to Census Data (2011), the Total Population of the district is 35,02,387 out of which there are 17,91,017 males (51.13%) & 17,11,370 females (48.87%). The population density in the district is 771 persons per sq km.

Some of the major areas in terms of density of population (according to 2001 census) are:

- Rampurhat(M) (12813persons per sq. km),
- Dubrajpur(M) (1946 persons per sq. km),
- Suri(M) (6883persons per sq. km),
- Sainthia(M) (4968persons per sq. km),
- Bolpur(M) (6122 persons per sq. km)



The per capita income in the district was found out to be Rs 16466/- during the year 2003-04. 56% of total work force depends on agriculture for their livelihoods.


Infrastructure:

Railway:

- The total length of rail track in the district is 201.32 km, including 26.55 km of the Ahmedpur-Katwa_narrow gauge track.
- > The Sahibgani Loop of the Eastern Railway passes through this district. There is a junction at Nalhati for the connection to Azimganj in Murshidabad district. The Andal-Sainthia_Branch Line connects it to the main Howrah-Delhi main line at Andal.

Local railway network is one of the major means of transportation for vegetables, fruits, fresh milk, chana.



It has been observed that one of the major sources of water for food processing units in West Bengal is ground water.


Blocks with average depth of ground water more than 12 meters during April, 2011 are:







Investment opportunities:

- > This is one of the districts where raw material base like fruits and vegetables are not enough strong to create any cost advantage for manufacturing units. However units in micro and small scale can be set up to meet the local demand.
- > This district can be developed for rearing of animals like Bengal Black Goat, Cattle which in turn may help to attract related industries in the district.
- > Only exception is paddy processing where rice millers can source paddy from adjacent district Burdwan.
- Moreover tradition *Til Khaja* and *Morraba* can be promoted through proper branding as the items produced from the district has accessibility to other districts of West Bengal.
